# SUGGESTIONS IN REGARD TO PREPARING THE RECORD.

## STATE OF NEW YORK BUREAU OF MILITARY RECORD,

*Albany, August 10th, 1865.*

To THE TOWN CLERK:

It is desirable that the following suggestions be particularly observed in preparing the record.

I. The MIDDLE name, if any, as well as the FIRST name of each Officer, Soldier or Seaman, should be written in full.

II. The PRESENT rank refers to rank now held in the service, or, if out of service, to rank at the date of muster-out, or at the time of death, if deceased.

III. The Regiment and Company refer to the regiment and company which the party entered at the time he was CREDITED to the QUOTA of YOUR TOWN.

IV. In giving amount of relief granted to family, the weekly or monthly rate, if so paid, or if paid by Town Board, the gross sum may be given.

V. The given name of father and the MAIDEN name of mother are desired.

VI. The promotions, only so far as they may be known to you, are expected; but the more important facts, relating to service, to death and burial, (if deceased,) to being wounded, (if at any time wounded,) or, if taken prisoner, to that event, are required.

VII. The book should be paged by you after the fourth, which is already paged.

VIII. An Index is furnished at the end of the book, in which you are desired to write all the names ALPHABETICALLY, (two columns of names to a page, to save space,) of Officers, Soldiers and Seamen, embraced in the record. The names and pages only are desired in the Index, thus: "Brown, Jeremiah. 5."

On the last sheet of the book, before the Index, are blanks for the record of Officers and Seamen from your town. With a view to being clearly understood three examples of record are given on the second and third pages below.

That no individual shall be omitted from the list of volunteers from your town, it is desired that a separate page be devoted to those who, though living in your town, have enlisted and been credited elsewhere.

HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS HOMELESS THROUGH EARTHQUAKE AND FLAMES

HUNDRED THOUSAND ARE WITHOUT HOMES; DAMAGE \$200,000,000

Fire Spread in San Francisco in Spite of Use of Dynamite to Check Advance.

BUSINESS PART OF CITY IS EITHER DESTROYED OR DOOMED

Residence Districts Attacked by Blaze While Firemen Are Helpless Through Lack of Water.

MARTIAL LAW IS DECLARED; LOOTERS ARE SHOT DOWN

Additional Earthquakes Add to Terror of People—Finest Buildings Are Destroyed—Outgoing Trains Crowded With Refugees.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18, 10 p. m.—It looks now as if the entire city would be burned. The Associated Press men are trying to get the news matter to Oakland by boat, but the latter are very uncertain.

The government is furnishing tugs, but the confusion is so great that they cannot be relied upon. It will be impossible to send full details for several days.

Thousands of persons are fleeing to the hills and clamoring for places on the ferry boats to cross the bay.

The damage is now believed to have reached \$200,000,000.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—The first message received from General Funston arrived here at 11:40 o'clock to-night as follows:

"Secretary of War, Washington: "We need thousands of tents and all the rations that can be sent. The business portion of the city destroyed and about 100,000 people homeless. "Fire still raging. Troops all on duty resisting the police. Loss of life probably 1,000. Best part of residence district not yet burned."

(Signed) "Funston."

Orders will go forward from the War Department to-morrow to the adjacent posts to carry out General Funston's recommendations.


FIRE FOLLOWS FIRST SHOCK; DAY'S RECORD AWFUL HISTORY OF WORK OF DESTRUCTION

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18.—The earthquake and fire today have caused the greatest calamity California ever has known.

At least five persons have been killed, a thousand injured and the property loss will amount to \$200,000,000.

It was 5:15 this morning when a terrific earthquake shock shook the whole city and surrounding country.

The western Union was cut completely out of business and the Postal Company was the only one that managed to get a wire out of the city.

PARTIAL ROLL OF EARTHQUAKE'S DEAD

Many Victims Killed in Their Beds When Shock Came. Policemen Meet Their Fates in the Streets.

- SAN FRANCISCO, April 18.—The following is a partial list of the dead: Annie Whelan, killed while sitting in her bed at her home, No. 212 Broadway street. The ceiling of an adjoining cottage fell upon the roof under which she was sleeping and she was buried under the brick and mortar. Maria Moran, No. 2705 London street, died under falling wall. Philip Macdonald, Sacramento, Seventh and Ninth streets. Louis Palumbo, Montgomery and Market streets. Miss Mary Drumm. Mrs. William J. Gilman, killed at entrance of City Hall. Benjamin J. Publico, Nevada Banker, shot while at City Hall. E. Gray, No. 22 Mission street. Mark Deane, No. 22 Stevenson street. J. Lachmann, No. 47 Stevenson street. J. Murphy, 20 1/2 Stevenson street. Mrs. Ida Hester, George and Jackson streets. Dr. Eimont, physician, killed in his room on the eighth floor of the Golden Gate Hotel. William was in bed when the shock struck and he died. Frank Burns, native of England, 43 years old, killed by wall falling upon him at No. 25 Gray street. Mrs. McGowan. Alphon Robinson and wife. William Carr, No. 217 Ellis street. Patrick Schmitt, Valencia street. Mrs. Lena Crowley, No. 14 Steppan street. Mrs. McKee, 116 Market street. E. A. Tucker, No. 227 Market street. Mrs. G. B. Nichols and John Stewart. William Brown, 1245 Fulton street, and died at Mechanics Building. Peter Linn, Windsor Hotel, Coroner. Unknown Dead.

Three children, two unknown white women, unknown white man, soldier, unknown man, African and PAIR girls. Unknown man, Wilson Street. Second and Tenth streets. Unknown father and son, Third at No. 117 Calhoun street, killed under a falling wall.

Others and walls. Many were instantly crushed to death, while others were gradually crushed.

Those who remained injured generally escaped with their lives, though some were hit by detached plaster, glass and articles thrown to the floor by the shock. It is believed that some or less than was sustained by nearly every family in the city.

The hotel where brew manufacturers stood the worst better than other buildings. Few of them were badly damaged. The big department store, which had been in process of construction, suffering the heaviest loss, was a complete failure. Its roof was collapsing and many workers being swept across the bay.

Some of the public and street works along the shore and near the Third Street bridge were injured. The high tower will stand to be torn down.

SPLENDID CITY HALL DAMAGED. A portion of the new City Hall, which cost over seven million dollars, collapsed. The roof falling into the court yard and crushing the building below. The great dome was moved, but did not fall.

The Valencia Hotel, a five-story wooden building, sank into the basement, a pile of splintered timbers, under which were pressed, many dead and dying members of the house. The structure was 100 ft. square and some of the timbers within were spruce.

Recently built the earth, caused to shake when fire broke out simultaneously in many places. The Fire Department promptly responded to the first calls for aid. It is reported that the water mains had been ruptured, unless by the underground movement.

MASONS QUICK TO SEND RELIEF

Central City Consistory Telegraphs Money for Sufferers.

Part of Paid, Monthly a Legacy to Mrs. Annie L. Locks—Many Await in Fear News of Friends.

The Syracuse people saw in the first hour of the disaster in San Francisco, the suffering of the people and the loss of their property.

The Central City Consistory of the Grand Orient of the United States, in the city of Syracuse, N. Y., has telegraphed to the Grand Orient of the United States, in the city of San Francisco, N. Y., to send them \$10,000 for the relief of the sufferers.

One of the latest to acquire business interests in San Francisco was Mrs. Annie L. Locks, of No. 124 West Broadway street, who inherited a large inheritance from her father, who was killed in the earthquake.

No personal messages from San Francisco were received in Syracuse yesterday by either the Western Union or Postal Telegraph Company, and the anxiety of people having friends in the Pacific slope has increased.

The Syracuse Relief was a letter yesterday about 100 feet of work done.

The office of three insurance papers, The Chronicle, the Standard, and the Herald, which were in the city, were destroyed.

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THEATERS AND HOTELS BURNED

Fire Completes the Work of Shocks.

BEST PLAYHOUSES DESTROYED

Rialto and Caserly Buildings Also Go.

IDENTIFYING THE VICTIMS.

Sad Scenes at the Merchants Pavilion. Injured and Dead Rescued as the Flames Slowly Approach.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18.—All efforts to prevent the fire from reaching the Palace and Grand Hotels were unavailing and both were completely destroyed, together with their contents.

All of San Francisco's best playhouses, including the Majestic, Columbia, Orpheum and Grand Theatre House, are a mass of ruins.

The handsome Rialto and Caserly buildings were burned to the ground, as was everything else in that district.

Sad Scenes at Pavilion. The scene at the Merchants Pavilion during the early hours of the morning and up until noon, when all the injured and dead were rescued because of the fire, was one of indescribable sadness.

Thousands of persons hurriedly went through the building lowering the rope on which the sufferers lay, in the hope that they would locate some loved one that was missing.

Used as a Morgue. The dead were placed in one section of the building, the remainder being devoted to hospital purposes.

City Hall, Partly Wrecked, Cost \$7,000,000—Merchants Exchange Just Completed and Occupied by Southern Pacific.

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
