

Statistics

This year, we are experiencing a boost in our programming numbers, thanks to the hard work of our librarians and support staff. In 2022, we achieved a 66% increase in programs offered during the year and 229% increase in program attendance. In 2023, I would expect to level off a little, but so far, our numbers are still increasing, especially with regard to attendance. Program statistics for January-April of 2023 show an increase of 12% more programs at Central (from 92 to 103), with 65% higher attendance (from 912 to 1,507). In March, although we did the same number of programs as last March, there was a rise of 150% in attendance numbers.






Services & Collection

- Kate booked a special CLRC traveling exhibit on "Immigration in New York State 1650-1950". It will be up for the month of May, to coincide with Local History's special focus on immigration.
- As always, Dan and Kate assisted patrons in LH/G with some interesting questions, including a patron from Rochester who has a familial connection with Guglielmo Marconi and wanted information on our Marconi bust. Dan assisted the registrar from the Comfort Tyler Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in researching Revolutionary War patriots buried in Oakwood Cemetery and Kate researched an interesting question from a patron in France about a French war bride who married a WWI Lysander soldier and traveled to America in 1919. Dan also gathered photos of previous Ossie Golden Trustee Award winners for the ceremony early in April, and he created a special display for the Board Retreat featuring photos and articles from Central's move to the Galleries in the nineties.
- ❖ Teen Fiction Raz and Nan are working on a special project to shelve Teen Fiction by categories. Raz has completed assigning all the books into seven genres. Color-coded dot stickers were ordered for the next phase, when Raz and Nan will relabel and shelve all of the books into their genre collections. Additionally, based upon data that Raz is gathering, they can weed the collection and increase purchases in higher circulating genres.

For Children

- **❖ Storytime with Miss Lauren, Thursdays** @ **10:30** − (Attendance =17)
- ❖ KidSpace Activities Nancy has been creating some great activities for KidSpace visitors! They had 30 kids participate in the monthly craft with tissue paper flowers and "doodle on the moon"; 14 kids participated in a Super Mario Bros. Bingo game; 10 kids participated in a solar system bingo game for Earth Day; and there were also two special science activities involving color changing flowers and walking water.
- **❖ Empower CNY Tutoring, Saturdays 1:30-3:00** − Free tutoring for kids in grades K-8, with volunteer high school tutors. Registration is required to attend. Please register at empowerchy.org (Attendance = 20)

For Adults

- **❖ Talk to a Lawyer, Tuesdays at 12:00** Patrons can drop in for free legal information, assistance, and representation in civil legal matters. (Attendance = 12)
- ❖ Weekly programs w/Arc of Onondaga, Wednesdays at 9:30 Every other week, Arc groups visit Trudi and Lauren at Central for crafts in the MakerSpace and movies in the Community Room. (Attendance = 23)
- **❖ Drop-In Tech Help** Patrons can get help from staff 5 days a week with all their technology questions, including personal tablets and phones. (Attendance = 22)
- ❖ Yoga with Dan, Tuesday evenings Yoga instructor Dan Nichols provides this calming program to our patrons on the second and third Tuesdays of the month. (Attendance = 26)
- ❖ Community Health Resources Health organizations now provide regular twice-monthly tabling events at the library. Organizations include The Prevention Network, Helio Health, Syracuse Healthy Start, F.A.C.E.S., Syracuse Surge Initiative, Planned Parenthood, and the Onondaga County Health Department. The groups met with about 37 patrons to talk about their services.
- ❖ Tracing the Hidden Half: Finding & Documenting Your Female Ancestors, Friday April 14 – Kate hosts monthly programs on topics of interest in Local History and Genealogy.
