Patron Interactions, Reference Assistance & Community Connections

- ❖ Hannah Bewsher curated a list of audiobooks, printed and delivered it to an elderly patron who has trouble using the computer and is losing her ability to read print books. After receiving the list of audiobooks, she gave Hannah a call to communicate her great appreciation for Petit taking care to keep her connected to the library, and that it had helped to lift her spirits because she feels as though her access to the library is as important to us as it is to her.
- Science Saturday: The Young Naturalists visited Petit again in December with a wonderful program. Participants learned about owls, and then they had a chance to dissect owl pellets! 14 children and 7 adults attended this program.
- Outreach: Petit staff visited the Westcott Community Center's senior lunch program with books and DVDs for checkout

- A group of 15 Girl scouts and 3 adults from Ed Smith School walked to the library for their meeting. They listened to a story about Mae Jemison and then had lots of time to look at books and participate in other passive programs available for visitors. They loved the Scavenger Hunt and the Paper Dragon Craft.
- Petit clerk Dawn Chapman was invited to breakfast at the Century Club to show a group of seniors how to fold origami cranes so they could participate in Petit's Fold- a- Crane for Peace initiative.
- Children's librarian Quinn Gardner hosted a Slime Party for children during school break week in December. Petit had a full house with children making their base slime, and then adding fake snow, hand lotion, glitter and shaving cream to their slime. One parent said, "Thanks so much for doing this, so we don't have to."
- ❖ 47 Children participated in the Sneaky Snowpeople Scavenger hunt in the children's room in December. Petit LA, Emily Coleman created 10 snowpeople holding up little letter signs and placed them around the children's room. Children used their patterning skills to match the letter the snowman was holding with the correct color/pattern hat and scarf, once they filled in the letters and found the answer to the riddle they got a small prize.
- Petit conducted a mitten drive in December. Children's mittens were donated to the nearby Sumner Street Head Start program.
